## **Washington Update**

White House Releases \$1.75 Trillion Build Back Better Framework

Last November, the White House and Congressional Democrats announced a new framework and released draft text for the Build Back Better Act. Totaling \$1.75 trillion, the revised framework and draft bill lay out a plan to expand and support key domestic programs at about half the originally proposed price tag of \$3 trillion. As negotiations continue, the framework and text released propose to invest \$400 billion in early childcare and universal Pre-K, increase investments in K-16 education by \$21.4 billion and extend and revise the child tax credit and the earned income tax credit for \$200 billion. Specific to education and related programs, investments target the educator pipeline by funding key higher education preparation programs at \$810 million, including \$160 million for personnel under Part D of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The Pell Grant maximum award would increase by \$550 annually, and career and

technical education programs, as well as adult literacy and education, are expanded by \$700 million each.

Consistent with Biden's promise to improve access and equity for individuals with disabilities, the Build Back Better Act would invest \$150 billion in home-based care services, provide \$10 million for the <u>Assistive Technology Act</u>, and create a grant program for \$270 million to incentivize states to increase access to competitive integrated employment and stop funding programs that pay subminimum wages in sheltered workshops to people with intellectual disabilities.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) provided funding to recruit, hire, and train public health workers to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and prepare for future public health challenges. ARPA directed those funds may be used to offset costs of hiring a range of public health professionals, including but not limited to social support professionals, community health workers, communication and policy experts, and "other positions" as may be required to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19.

On November 10, 2021, the Administration for Community Living (ACL) announced a \$150 million investment to expand the public health workforce within the aging and disability networks. In January 2022, ACL began the process of distributing the funding to grantees. We are currently in the process of how to best spend those funds.
